





GENERAL SUMMER GERMAN LANGUAGE COURSE IN MUNICH

August 5th - August 28th, 2019 www.ssk-misu.de





General course description and objectives

This four-week German language course is an intensive class. It is designed for foreign students in all areas of study and provides language training at all levels. The main goal of the course is to combine language training with regional and cultural studies. Thus, each course is designed to teach the language within academic, cultural and societal contexts. Students will deepen their knowledge of Germany, while simultaneously developing their language skills. One main focus will be the German higher education system and student life in Germany. The course will also examine and explore social contexts relating to everyday life and culture in Munich. Depending on the language proficiency and interest of each group, further topics (esp. current topics) will be covered regarding German history, society, politics, literature, art, music, German television and movies.

The course aims to promote intercultural learning. Intercultural learning will not be limited to Germans and their culture, but also extend to the participants' cultures. Teachers will therefore strongly encourage communication among participants about their individual cultures.

Extracurricular activities, such as visiting Neuschwanstein, Salzburg or the Concentration Camp in Dachau, will be coordinated in class beforehand and discussed in subsequent classes as follow-up to the trip.

Projects are used not only to learn more about Munich and its inhabitants, but also to encourage students to reflect on intercultural encounters and experiences, and thereby develop new language skills. Core course element is the "Project Day" which has to be carried out by participants in all groups.

Project Day

Classes will select topics of interest (e.g. district of Munich, sightseeing spots, museums, exhibitions etc.), prepare questionnaires for interviews of locals, visit the place of interest and then present their personal experience in class.

Prerequisites and placement test

Groups shall be assigned according to the results of an online placement test, distributed by email in July. All participants must complete the online placement test. This guarantees that the language teaching level within each class is tailored to the ability of the participants.

Detailed course description

Elementary Groups (A1, A2) - Beginners (Complete Beginners)

This course is intended for students who have no or limited prior knowledge of German. Participants study the foundational aspects of German grammar, develop their comprehension of low to medium difficulty texts, write short pieces of work, and practice speaking about everyday basic topics. Students will also deal with cultural issues, including topics associated with Munich and its region.

Active participation in class

 Active participation will be evaluated based on subjective marks for participation in all class aspects (based on initiative to talk, willingness to communicate, volunteering answers, asking questions, cooperation in a team, etc.) and being prepared for class (including homework assignments).

Project Day and presentation

 The class will select a topic of interest (district of Munich, sightseeing spots, museums, exhibitions etc.). Students will be divided into small groups, and will research their topic with help from the lecturer. Groups will prepare a short questionnaire and then interview locals regarding their topic while visiting the place of interest. Each group will then present the results of their project.

Passing the final exam

• Participants will write a final exam based on course themes. The test will consist of the following sections: vocabulary, phrases, grammar, composition and regional studies.

Evaluation:

Active participation in class: 20%

Active participation in Project Day: 20%

Oral presentation of project results: 20%

Final exam: 40%

Intermediate (B1 – B2)

Participants should already have a solid understanding of the grammar topics taught in the beginner course. Teaching is based on: refreshing and expanding participants' current knowledge of German grammar, developing their comprehension of literary texts and articles from newspapers and magazines, and encouraging participants to develop their written and conversational skills on topical subjects.

Advanced and Proficient (C1)

The advanced and proficient level is suitable only for participants who are already fluent in German. Participants develop their capacity to analyze and discuss texts covering different aspects of German literature, culture, and society. Teaching at this level is weighted more on improvement of style and idiom use, and less on grammar skills. Grammatical structures will be covered according to the needs of the course members. We will also concentrate on language as specifically pertaining to academic study.

Various types of current texts such as literature, newspaper and magazine articles, academic articles, technical reports relating to specific fields (architecture and others), and audio / film materials.

German Language Levels

Levels (A1-C2) are assigned according to the <u>Common European Framework of Reference for Languages CEFR</u>.

A1	Can understand and use familiar everyday expressions and very basic phrases aimed at the			
	satisfaction of needs of a concrete type. Can introduce him/herself and others and can ask and			
	answer questions about personal details. Can interact in a simple way provided the other person			
	talks slowly and clearly.			
A2	Can understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to areas of most immediate			
	relevance (e.g. very basic personal and family information etc.). Can communicate in simple and			
	routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters.			
	Can describe in simple terms aspects of his/her background, immediate environment and matters in			
	areas of immediate need.			
B1	Can understand the main points of clear standard input on familiar matters regularly encountered in			
	work, school, leisure, etc. Can deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling in an area			
	where the language is spoken. Can produce simple connected text on topics which are familiar or of			
	personal interest. Can describe experiences and events, dreams, hopes and ambitions and briefly			
	give reasons and explanations.			
B2	Can understand the main ideas of complex text on both concrete and abstract topics, including			
	technical discussions in his/her field of specialisation. Can interact with a degree of fluency and			
	spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible. Can produce clear,			
	detailed text and explain a viewpoint on a topical issue giving the advantages and disadvantages of			
	various options.			
C1	Can understand a wide range of demanding texts, and recognise implicit meaning. Can express			
	him/herself fluently and spontaneously without much obvious searching for expressions. Can use			
	language flexibly and effectively for social, academic and professional purposes. Can produce clear,			
	well-structured, detailed text on complex subjects, showing controlled use of organisational patterns,			
	connectors and cohesive devices.			
C2	Can understand with ease virtually everything heard or read. Can summarise information from			
	different spoken and written sources, reconstructing arguments and accounts in a coherent			
	presentation. Can express him/herself spontaneously, very fluently and precisely, differentiating			
	finer shades of meaning even in more complex situations.			

Grade, Credits, Transcripts

Contact hour requirements:

Transcripts:

• Every student will receive an official transcript after successful completion of all program requirements. The transcript will show the course name and contact hours, the number of acquired credits as well as grade achieved.

Credit transfer:

• Most international colleges and universities accept credits from the MISU LMU, however each institution has its own policy regarding credit acceptance from other institutions. We strongly recommend that students consult their academic advisor and/or professor in order to receive credit transfer approval before applying to the MISU Summer Language Course. Students who would like to transfer credits to their home universities should print out all documentation to present to either their professor or study abroad advisor when asking for credit and grade approval.
